

Improving Your Reading with Predicting Pip: Out on the Ocean

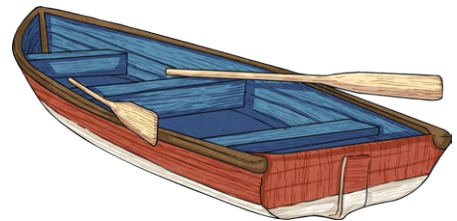

Answers

1. What do you think the two men intended to do? Why do you think this?

Pupils' own responses, such as: I think that the rest of this story will be about two fishermen who make an extraordinary catch whilst out fishing.

4. In this extract, the author heavily describes the current weather and sea condition. Do you think this will change as the story progresses? Explain your answer.

Pupils' own responses, such as: Yes, I think that this will change because the story's plot would not be exciting if the weather remained calm and the men were able to sail easily.
